Three themes for Q3 2022: The Great Reset

Hard or crash landing?

- Rising inflation expectations on the back of persistently high current inflation has forced the Fed to match its hawkish rhetoric with hawkish action: we may see two consecutive 50bp hikes in Q3, with 75bp also remaining a possibility. The market is pricing in the peak in Fed funds at 3.50-3.75% in H1 2023.
- This suggests some acceptance of the hard landing risks stemming from aggressive tightening, as the Fed tries to gain control over inflation; we have raised the chances of a hard landing for the US economy to 60% from 35% last guarter.
- While the ECB and BOE are likely to pursue a shallower hiking path due to more imminent recession risk, and China is beginning its recovery from Zero-Covid Policy (ZCP) lockdowns, the downside risks to global growth have exponentially increased.

China re-emerges from lockdown

- China is re-emerging from ZCP lockdowns, which generated a short but severe economic downturn in April and May. While positive, we are cautious about the pace and strength of recovery, and on uncertainties related to post-lockdown behaviour, policy constraints, domestic and geo-politics and the potential for more variants and further lockdowns.
- China's fiscal and monetary policy are increasingly supportive, but whether its economic recovery is strong enough to offset a slowdown and potential recession in the US and Europe has yet to be seen.

The global consumer is put to the test



- Buoyed by Covid stimulus, DM consumers start from a strong position, but are quickly seeing their real purchasing power eroded. Real
 wages in the US and EU have not kept pace, and the resulting discontent is reflected in record low consumer confidence indicators.
- China consumption may also prove sluggish, with the experience of ZCP lockdowns still fresh and unemployment rising sharply.
- A key piece of the puzzle with regard to the severity of the global landing is whether the global consumer, and in particular the US consumer and homebuyer, will survive inflation and the rate hiking cycle intact.




Can the Fed regain control?

Long-term inflation expectations now above 3%, triggering aggressive Fed action to curb aggregate demand


Market-implied path of Fed Funds

...wage growth must moderate










ECB: Rates likely to exit negative territory in 2022, but a dovish turn and antifragmentation tools are also on the table

The Bank aims to balance its inflation target against fragmentation and recession risks


Market-implied path: ECB policy rate

Peripheral spreads (bps)












Reopening and policy are supportive in China, but uncertainties in policy execution, consumer/corporate behaviour, global growth and politics may be offsetting factors

7 day moving average for trucking activity shows the impact of Shanghai's lockdown





Management sentiment by region







A modest acceleration in labour costs...








Multi Asset: Key takeaways

Cautious for now: Underweight risk assets

• We believe risk assets do not fully reflect increased chances of a hard landing. Our core view is underweight equities and credit, although we acknowledge the possibility of a bounce in the coming weeks given very negative sentiment. We are also overweight government bonds in order to avoid being underweight duration.

Prefer selected emerging market equities vs Europe

 Europe has a challenging Q3 ahead. However, some emerging market economies, particularly those that export commodities, have supportive valuations and a better relative growth outlook. We are neutral on US, Japan, and Asia Pacific equities.

Expect dollar strength to continue

• We think the dollar's strength could continue while the Fed is still aggressively tightening. However, we think the recent yen weakness could carry on, as rate differentials with Japan and RoW continue.

Defensively positioned in credit

• Given the macro headwinds, we prefer investment grade to high yield bonds to increase defensiveness. Investment grade offers relatively better valuations, while we think high yield spreads could widen further from here. Within government bonds, we are neutral, awaiting further information on central bank plans.


Regional equities: Overweight emerging markets vs. Europe

Looking for relative resilience to elevated commodity prices

Tight demand and supply dynamics should keep commodities elevated in the near term, helping EM commodity exporters. EM valuations are attractive, especially LatAm.



We expect at least a technical recession in Europe as consumers are under extreme pressure. We are underweight Europe equities as a result.








Dollar strength likely to continue despite long run, but not expecting Fed pivot in Q3




Credit: Overweight investment grade vs. high yield

Equities: Key takeaways

Volatility likely to stay high in Q3

 Until inflation is brought under control and central banks reduce their hawkish rhetoric, markets are likely to be volatile, favouring bottom-up stock picking.
 Earnings-based valuations are back around long term averages but profitability is still high compared to history.

Rotation to value could continue

• The rotation to value we have witnessed in 2022 so far could well continue for the time being. Value still looks relatively cheap on forward PE metrics. High growth tech stocks have borne the brunt of higher discount rates. However, there could be opportunities to find fallen angels here in Q3.

US consumers come under pressure

 Real wages and savings rates are turning negative in the US, while mortgage rates increased dramatically. Consumer balance sheets are strong for now though. As costs rise and orders fall, margins could come under pressure.

Japan could present opportunities

 Japan could offer a DM diversification option that has exposure to EM and China, which could be a source of growth if the Covid situation improves.



Fixed Income: Key takeaways

Risk of hard landing not priced in

 The Fed is still tightening aggressively, raising the risk of a hard landing. Further tightening could widen credit spreads as expectations for defaults in a recessionary environment rise. Capital preservation is key.

Do not fear duration

 We don't believe that central banks will be able to deliver on current market expectations for tightening.
 This means duration is becoming attractive.

Very attractive valuations in Euro IG

Yields in Euro IG have now risen to levels not seen since 2019. We consider this a good buying opportunity. However, we put a strong emphasis on high-quality credit, such as A-rated companies, banks and industrials as well as German corporates, all of which have features that should be able to withstand the effects of a potential recession.

Narrative could change quickly, presenting opportunities


 Economic conditions can and do change. It might not happen in Q3, but we may see both growth and monetary policy shift sooner than the market expects. When that happens, there will be considerable opportunities on offer.



Risk of hard landing not yet priced in to credit markets



Spreads creeping up but room for further widening





US yields have exploded this year, but it's difficult to see how they could move meaningfully higher from here





Private Credit: Key takeaways

Anticipate increasing pressures to become fully visible in earnings over the next 12-18 months

Unprecedented challenges for analysts to understand company transportation networks, supply chains and inventory build. Potential for an abrupt slowdown but the severity is hard to gauge. Working with companies to understand alternative short and longer term goods sourcing strategies and the impact this will have structurally on earnings. Renewed focus on hedging strategies for raw material costs, FX and interest rates.

Due to earnings pressure we expect risks at the lowest end of the ratings scale to increase, but structural features should prevent high default rates

Around 98%* of broadly syndicated loans are cov-lite, so do not carry covenants that could trigger a default, while hedging and pricing structures dilute the impact of rising rates. The bulk of existing European loans do not need refinancing until 2024 or after, and private equity owners are expected to step in to provide liquidity to those portfolio companies that need it.

Limited demand for risk from Collateralised Loan Obligations (CLOs), the largest buyers of European leveraged loans

CLOs are not net new buyers of assets at the moment, but not forced sellers either. Around 80 CLOs are warehousing stock, with step-up pricing to kick in end Q3 for some older warehouses. Banks working on a number of solutions to counter lack of supply, including print and sprints, terming out warehouses or unwinding. Warehouses that are "full on the ramp" may consider splitting assets across warehouses.

Opportunities exist for investors with the cleanest portfolios and available liquidity


Focus on defensive companies with sticky recurring revenues, high and stable margins and strong cash generation. Leverage loan market heavily weighted towards these sectors such as healthcare, software and business services. This should provide good opportunities during periods of market dislocation.





Bonds of Market Concern vs. Default Rate





Real Estate: Key takeaways

A nervous investment market

- There is a thinner pool of bidders for assets on the market, and the pipeline of buildings coming to market has declined significantly.
- Appears to be a 'sellers strike' underway, while buyers digest a rapidly rising cost of debt.
- Current pending transaction activity points to one of the lowest quarters of investment since the depths of the first Covid lockdown.

Inflation protected leases

- There is some inflation protection offered via index linked leases, particularly so on the Continent, which will drive rents, and hence support values to some degree as yields shift outwards.
- However, weak economic growth is a problem, which together with high inflation may lead to overrenting in portfolios which will hit valuations.
- Indexation is not a permanent protection as rents will be marked to market at some point.

Real estate pricing

- There tends to be a long lag between changes in interest rates and real estate values, which is more a function of how values are determined in the sector, than a lack of sensitivity on behalf of investors.
- Anecdotally, we have seen deals pulled from the market due to a failure to meet the asking price, which means there is no new evidence to say values are lower, despite the likely reality that they are for certain sectors.


Occupiers still active

- Activity continues to pick up in the office occupier market, with a sharp focus on sustainability. Prime office rents have been surpassed in some markets for highly sustainable offices where availability is very low.
- No signs of a significant slow down in demand for industrial space, despite high profile announcements from ecommerce players. Vacancy rates remain at de minimis levels which will support rents even if/when demand eases to some degree.


